NCGS STATEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

The North Carolina Genealogical Society encourages researchers to uphold high standards for their genealogical research, analysis, and publication. Care should be taken to document properly all information included in a genealogical work. Researchers should remember that the original document is the proper source for all information.

When the original cannot be found, careful analysis of secondary materials (including Internet sites) should be fully explained and sources cited.

Given modern technology and the ease of accessing information on the Internet, researchers are encouraged to respect the privacy of all living individuals by not sharing personal information via electronic media. While the courts have not yet fully tested copyright issues involving the Internet, the same respect should be paid to information found on the Internet as is paid to information in printed works bearing notice of copyright. Under United States copyright law, an individual's intellectual output is protected whether or not it bears a copyright notice or symbol and regardless of the medium in which it appears.

NCGS encourages and expects its members to uphold high moral standards in their use of electronic media, in their research, and in their interaction with fellow genealogists and other persons. Ethical behavior by individuals will reflect well upon our organization, as well as the field of genealogy, generally.

The Alleghany Historical – Genealogical Society

According to the Society's website, (<http://www.ls.net/~ahgs/>), the Alleghany Historical-Genealogical Society (AHGS) was formed in 1978 by a group of interested citizens. Their intent was to increase their knowledge about genealogy and the history of their community, and to better educate themselves and their neighbors about their state and nation.

One of AHGS' goals is to discover and collect materials that would document or illustrate the genealogy and history of the area. To that end, many local projects have been undertaken since the Society's inception. In addition to collecting census and local family records and Civil War materials, the Society has completed a county cemetery survey and a county Heritage book. Historical artifacts like

photographs, paintings, furniture, tools, etc. illustrating daily life in Alleghany County have been collected. The Society hopes one day to have a museum in which to display their collection.

Currently, the Society's collection of genealogical books and papers is in a special section of the County library. An alphabetical listing of this collection is available at the Society's website. The publications for sale by the Society are listed at the website's *General Store*.

The Society meets at 2:30pm on the 4th Sunday of each month (except December) at the County Public Library in Sparta (122 N. Main Street).

Individual membership in the Society is \$10.00 per year. Several membership levels are available including a life membership (\$100). Annual Membership includes their quarterly publication. Please send all correspondence and membership inquiries to:

Alleghany County was formed in 1859 from Ashe County. It "was named for an Indian tribe."¹ According to the North Carolina Gazetteer, "The name is a corruption of the Delaware Indian name for the Allegheny and Ohio rivers and is said to have meant *a fine stream*."²

Alleghany is bounded by the state of Virginia (Grayson County) and the North Carolina counties of Surry, Wilkes, and Ashe. The boundary line between Alleghany and its neighboring North Carolina counties changed numerous times

following the county's formation, with the last change taking place in 1939.



Sparta, at the geographical center of the county, serves as the seat of government. The origins of Sparta are noted in the North Carolina Gazetteer as follows: "Post office est. here as Bower's Store, 1825; name changed to Gap Civil, 1846, and to Sparta, 1879"³. Further the Gazetteer recommends looking up *Gap Civil*. Gap Civil is where "local training camps were located ... during the first part of the Civil War."⁴ You can find Sparta at the crossroads of US Highway 21 and NC Highway 18.

REQUIREMENTS

For Manuscript Submission To the NCGS Journal

Mr. Winslow encourages submissions of original material to the *North Carolina Genealogical Society Journal*, which adhere to the following guidelines:

- (1) Legibility is the primary consideration.
- (2) Manuscripts may be submitted on computer disk or on paper. Computer disks must be accompanied by a paper copy. Computer files must be in a common word-

processing format such as Word Perfect or Microsoft Word.

- (3) Manuscripts submitted only on paper should be double spaced in an eleven point or greater font for body text; footnotes and endnotes should not be smaller than eight point.

- (4) Manuscripts will be evaluated for relevance to the general readership of the *Journal*. The nature, presentation, and documentation of contents are major factors in determining whether a manuscript should be published.

- (5) Preferred content includes but is not limited to unpublished records, records from burned counties, records naming numerous families, pre-1900 records, and records which illustrate phases of genealogical research.
