NCGS STATEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

The North Carolina Genealogical Society encourages researchers to uphold high standards for their genealogical research, analysis, and publication. Care should be taken to document properly all information included in a genealogical work. Researchers should remember that the original document is the proper source for all information.

When the original cannot be found, careful analysis of secondary materials (including Internet sites) should be fully explained and sources cited.

Given modern technology and the ease of accessing information on the Internet, researchers are encouraged to respect the privacy of all living individuals by not sharing personal information via electronic media. While the courts have not yet fully tested copyright issues involving the Internet, the same respect should be paid to information found on the Internet as is paid to information in printed works bearing notice of copyright. Under United States copyright law, an individual's intellectual output is protected whether or not it bears a copyright notice or symbol and regardless of the medium in which it appears.

NCGS encourages and expects its members to uphold high moral standards in their use of electronic media, in their research, and in their interaction with fellow genealogists and other persons. Ethical behavior by individuals will reflect well upon our organization, as well as the field of genealogy, generally.

NORTH CAROLINA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY 2005 AWARDS

THE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN PERIODICAL PUBLISHING for a periodical published by a local North Carolina Genealogical Society goes to *Journeys Through Jackson* by the **Jackson County Genealogical Society**.

The nomination states that Mr. Larry Crawford has been Chair of Publications for the Jackson County Genealogical Society for the past eleven years. In that capacity, he also served as Editor of the Society's newsletter, *Journeys Through Jackson*. Under his capable direction the journal has evolved into an excellent quarterly publication.

Every issue of *Journeys Through Jackson* contains an eclectic mix of genealogical data including vital records, family information, court records, reports on member's research, lineage charts, and cemetery censuses from adjacent counties. Mr. Crawford has eagerly sought primary source material such as church minutes, pension applications, and soldiers' diaries. He has published letters from Civil War soldiers and, over the course

of two years, dedicated an entire issue to patriots ranging from the Revolutionary War to Desert Storm. In addition to the varied articles, the JCGS Photo Album showcases old family photos and other pictures of historical significance. Occasionally a "mystery" photo will be used in an attempt to identify the persons or the subject.

As an integral part of each issue, Mr. Crawford ensures that all areas of the county are represented, taking the reader on a true "journey" through Jackson. This attention to detail and his dedication to accuracy have made the publication a resource that is prized by members of JCGS and has brought in new members who want to receive "the little green book."

The judges complemented the journal's appearance, layout, and content, specifically pointing out the good mix of family history and records. They felt that the journal did a good job in explaining the record types being presented. A particularly clever addition is the inclusion of old photographs with solicitations to the membership for help in identification.

THE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN WEB PRESENCE for a website published by a local North Carolina genealogical society goes to www.obcgs.com by the **Old Buncombe County Genealogical Society**.

In 1997, Old Buncombe County Genealogical Society became one of the first local genealogical societies in North

Carolina to launch a website. The current webmaster took over the care and management of this interface as a volunteer in 1999 with no previous experience.

According to the nomination, this is an excellent website with a good search engine, many links to other sites, research aids, a query section, information about the Society, information about the original extent of Buncombe County and families associated with it, marriage records, Bible records, Revolutionary War pension records, etc. The “First Families of Old Buncombe” pages are especially thorough and include some transcribed early census material.

The judges agree that this site excels in its wealth of information and in promoting user interaction—both important goals for any genealogical society website. All the judges were in agreement that www.obcgs.com deserves this award because the site provides superior research value. It is a wonderful vehicle to attract new society members, while, at the same time, serving as an excellent information resource for all-comers.

THE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN PUBLISHING a book, or set of books, of abstracts or transcriptions of original North Carolina primary source material goes to *North Carolina Slaves and Free Persons of Color* by **William L. Byrd, III** and **John H. Smith**.

According to the nomination, and volume introductions, Byrd and Smith have

transcribed and published county records not routinely covered in genealogical publications—obscure and fragile records in the North Carolina State Archives filed under the general heading of “Slaves and Free Negroes,” “Slaves and Free Persons of Color,” or simply “Miscellaneous Records.”

The authors have not limited their attention to one area of the state but have distributed this series throughout the eastern, western, and Piedmont counties.

The wealth of information to be found in these volumes varies county by county but may include such records as civil actions, criminal actions, weapon permits, sales and mortgages of slaves and free persons of color, hiring agreements, patrol records, divisions of slaves, and even unlawful marriages of slaves.

The volumes include not only transcriptions of original documents but also the laws in effect at the time they were generated. Since the records and the laws relate not only to slaves and free Negroes but also Native Americans, researchers interested in these groups have a wonderful resource.

Each volume features an index by full name, first name of slave, and subject as well as a glossary of legal terms.

To date, this series spans seven volumes covering 13 counties. The compilers are tireless, thorough and tenacious about their work.

THE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN PUBLISHING for a book of secondary material, or family history relevant to North Carolina, and published within eighteen months preceding the award, goes to *Heroes of the Sixties – Lest We Forget* by **Susan Waxmunski Todd**

Mrs. Todd, a Virginia native, has been a resident of Forest City, North Carolina, for more than 20 years. She became a member of the Burnt Chimney Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy in May of 2000. It was at the first meeting she attended that she was assigned to a project to try and locate all the C.S.A. veterans buried in the area. As the

project progressed, she became very interested in the lives and accomplishments of these men whose names were on the weathered gravestones. With much encouragement from her U.D.C. chapter president, Alice Bradley, other members,

and local historian, Jim Womack, "*Heroes of the Sixties*" was completed and published in 2004.

According to its introduction, this book is an effort to identify all the Confederate veterans buried in Rutherford County. The 1860 Census of Rutherford County shows that the county's population stood at 11, 573. One thousand seven hundred and thirty-four men enlisted from the county, which met the conscription requirement of fifteen per cent of the total population. This book identifies over 660 veterans who are buried in Rutherford County soil.

Statistics show that although North Carolina accounted for less than 10% of the Confederate population, it sent 20% of the South's soldiers. One fourth of all the Confederates killed in action were from North Carolina. Many of these men were buried in or near the battlefields where they fell, never to return to home and family.

Today, all that is left of these soldiers is mostly forgotten gravestones. Many are worn with age and covered in dark

moss, making the inscriptions nearly impossible to read. Although names and dates often survive the ages, the personal stories of these soldiers are mostly lost to us.

The information gathered in this book was taken directly from the sources noted in its bibliography. The facts are based on records kept during a time of war, when history was simply what people wrote down, and, in some cases, it may indeed be fallible. Additional information was gathered from contemporary newspapers and oral traditions passed down through the generations.

The book provides an index of veterans with birth and death dates. They are listed both by cemetery (along with a map of the cemeteries), and by company and regiment. Also provided are photographs, obituaries and a series of miscellaneous articles.

Mrs. Todd hopes that, through this work, some of these forgotten men may be retrieved from the oblivion of forgetfulness and their stories preserved.

This year's recipient of **THE AWARD for OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE NORTH CAROLINA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY BY A MEMBER** has been an active member for many years and has served on the Board of

NCGS for fifteen of those years. One person has called her a “first rate representative of the library community in her long tenure on the Board” and another said “she can be counted on to recognize trends in the field.” These are apt descriptions of her contributions as a member of this society.

This individual was first elected as Coastal Director in 1990, served as First Vice President from 1995 to 1999 and as President from 1999 to 2001. Since 2001, she has served as Immediate Past President. While serving as Coastal Director, she also filled the Publicity Coordinator’s position and edited the society publication *North Carolina Freedman’s Savings and Trust Company Records*. Her term as First Vice President saw the expansion of the NCGS Awards.

As President of the Society, she coordinated a joint NCGS and National Genealogical Society Regional Conference in Raleigh. This conference was described by then NGS President Fran Shane as “the largest ever in attendance.” Also during her presidency, the society published the NCGS *Journal* on CD.

As Past President, she considers her greatest accomplishment to be “producing the brochure *Family History in North Carolina from the Mountains to the Coast*.”

Other duties she has performed during her tenure with NCGS include chairing the Publications Incentives Committee, the Awards Committee, the Publicity Committee, and the Nominating Committee, and serving as Society Liaison.

She shouldered all of these duties while also heading the Special Collections Department of the New Hanover County Public Library, editing Old New Hanover Genealogical Society’s *Clarendon Courier*, and serving on the Historic District Commission of Wilmington. She has also written or edited six books, mainly on Wilmington history, and has completed two online digital history projects.

As her fifteen years on the NCGS Board comes to a close, it is with great pleasure that I present this year’s Award for Outstanding Contribution to the North

Carolina Genealogical Society by a Member to our friend and colleague, **Beverly Tetterton**.

THE AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO NORTH CAROLINA GENEALOGY is presented to an individual whose genealogical contributions have greatly enhanced the family history of the entire state or a region thereof. This year’s winner was **Doris Ward**.

According to Sandra Samz’ nomination, Doris Cline Ward was born in Canada and later lived in New York and Michigan. She married a native North Carolinian, raised two children, and later moved to Asheville, NC, bringing with her a passion to research her children’s southern roots. Doris had already conducted extensive research on her parents’ lines, tracing them back to England, Germany, and Ireland.

In Asheville, Doris joined the Western North Carolina Historical Society, since there was no local genealogical society at the time. In 1979, when a group of members expressed interest in creating a genealogical wing, Doris assumed a key role in forming the Old Buncombe County Genealogical Society (OBCGS). This new genealogical society encompassed the

thirteen westernmost counties of North Carolina, most of which were formed from what was originally Buncombe County. She has since assisted in founding other local genealogical societies in the region. Doris served as the OBCGS charter president from January 1980 until January 1984, and was reelected president in 1997, and 1999 for two-year terms.

Under her leadership as president and later as librarian, the Society has progressed rapidly and established a strong genealogical research library for the coastal states from New York to the Carolinas. The library has grown to include basic resources for the United Kingdom, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Europe and Canada. With no paid employees, the library is open six days a week and draws researchers from around the entire United States. Through the years, when the need for volunteers became an issue, Doris often worked five or six days a week to keep the doors open. Though she is now 86 years old, she continues to serve more than ten hours each week. Her dedication inspires and challenges those much younger to keep pace.

Doris was co-editor of the two *Buncombe County Heritage Books*, and served as editor for the society journal, *A Lot of Bunkum*, from 1982 through 1985, and 1988 through 1994. Much of that time, the journal was published monthly, in typewritten, mimeograph form.

Scots-Irish lines are strong in western North Carolina, so Doris established ties with the Irish Heritage Association in Belfast, Ireland, and has served as the local representative for that group.

Realizing the need for good basic genealogical training in the early years, Doris brought in nationally recognized speakers such as Helen Leary, Jo White Linn, Brent Holcomb, Hank Z. Jones, Jr., and Arlen Eakle.

In addition to all this service to OBCGS, Doris has, for several years published a family newsletter "*Prescotts Unlimited*" which sponsored research into the early Prescott immigrants; and another newsletter entitled "*Canadian Connections*"

for her own family. From producing these newsletters by typewriter and mimeograph, she has progressed to video production including "*From the Mountains to the Sea*" featuring the OBCGS library, "*Buncombe Beginnings*," a quick overview of the settlement of Western North Carolina, and "*The Fairbanks House Speaks to America*," emphasizing the background for the Great European Migration into New England. In addition, she has prepared a Power Point presentation that includes a narrative and a century and a half of family photographs. This documentary follows the westward migration of four great great grandparents.

In 1999, the Western North Carolina Historical Association recognized her when she received the WNC Historical Achievement Award. In 2003 Old Buncombe County Genealogical Society established a fund in her honor to promote genealogical education in the area.

For over twenty-five years, Doris Cline Ward has been (and remains) a guiding light for OBCGS and an inspiration to veteran researchers and novice genealogists, alike.

ANNUAL REPORTS—2005

- PRESIDENT

Four years ago, when I accepted the presidency of the North Carolina Genealogical Society, my major goal was to double the membership. I never considered that this might prove to be an impractical objective. However, during my tenure, I have learned that there are very few people in the modern world who comprehend the value of membership in any organization, whether it be civil, fraternal, educational, communitarian or recreational. Even churches are facing membership crises at this time—a circumstance which just 30 or 40 years ago would have been unimaginable. Most churches today that show increased attendance numbers are not focused on spiritual matters at all, but on

worldly affairs. If you were to attend, you might feel out of place.

In the past four years, we have held Board Meetings across this State from the Coast to the Mountains, trying to spread the good news of genealogy and attempting to make contact with the local people who are interested in this field of history. The Society has tried to put on a summer workshop in the east and west in alternate years. At each one of these workshops, we have hosted speakers of national reputation and have featured outstanding topics. Our hope was to enable anyone who was interested in genealogy to learn how to think analytically and, most importantly, to use primary documentation to find the answers.

As part of our effort to cut costs and keep the Society solvent, it has been necessary to reevaluate responsibilities and remuneration for each paid office. The Board of Directors has assisted in this process, though our collective decisions have not always proven popular. At the same time, the Board has approved a change in printers with the result that our quarterly publications are now produced more efficiently without sacrificing quality. I did not accept the position of NCGS president in order to curry favor. It was my sole intention to lead the Society in a positive direction that would render it stronger than I found it. As long as this Society looks toward its future and avoids pointless nostalgia, we will continue to be a strong organizational presence in North Carolina.

- FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT

This is my last report as the 1st Vice President of the North Carolina Genealogical Society. I have completed two 2-year terms and have enjoyed every moment. In this role, I have led the Liaison and Award Committees.

The Liaison Committee, at the NCGS Board's direction, managed NCGS' memberships in local genealogical societies, received the publications from those local genealogical societies that were subsequently transferred to the Genealogical

Branch of the State Library in Raleigh. I have also submitted *Society Salutes* to each NCGS Newsletter.

The Awards Committee facilitates the NCGS Awards process throughout the year by receiving nominations, locating judges, enabling all the judges to objectively evaluate each nomination, notifying all the nominees and then presenting the awards at the Annual Meeting in November. Seventeen nominations were received in 2005 in six different categories. Judges were solicited across the state with a wide variety of backgrounds. Since this is the first year with nominations in the category of *Excellence in Web Presence*, nationally known genealogical experts in web design and leaders of similar award programs in other states were solicited. I am always pleased and humbled at the generosity and willingness of our judges to help NCGS to promote excellence in genealogical publications and activities. The award winners are introduced in a ceremony in November. The award presentation will be published in *NCGS News*.

I have prepared the 2006 Call for Nominations for the next *NCGS News*. Unless my successor is named by the newsletter deadline, the nomination form will direct that entries should be sent to the Greenville address.

Technology Report:

While I will no longer be a member of the NCGS Board of Directors, I will continue to function as the webmaster for as long as I can or until NCGS no longer needs my services. The website is proving to be a great place to promote our society and draw the attention of potential new members. It is up to NCGS leaders to provide information out there that is current and timely and pertinent to NCGS and NC genealogy. I still have a lot of ideas for new features and hope to have the time to pursue them. If you have any new subjects or features you want to see added to the website, please contact me at any time.

Web Page Report:

The Member's Only web site went live April 1, 2005. Approximately 127 members have logged in and created their user profile. 20 queries have been posted. No new issues have been logged.

I request that the updates to the membership list be provided at least once per month and more often during busy membership renewals. I also request that new members be warned that it could be as much as a month before they may be able to access the Member's Only area (due to the monthly updates).

I have a backlog of new content for the Member's Only area and hope to make progress on those items in January 2006.

The public area continues to be maintained and continues to grow as we publish *NCGS News*, announcements, etc online each quarter.

Other Technical Items:

- Mailing lists: currently 214 subscribers to NCGS-L and 149 subscribers to NCGS-D.

This idea involves providing an index for the counties that were formed before the 1790 Census, so that researchers can place an ancestor in a North Carolina county prior to that date. This index is to include date of instrument, grantee, grantor, book, page and kind of deed. It will be placed under the "members only" section of the NCGS website. It will be thoroughly searchable.

I have had some volunteers from around the state offer to help gather information. Questions have arisen that have slowed my progress but I think we have most of that ironed out. - **SECRETARY AND BOOK DISTRIBUTOR**

Membership for 2005 ends at 1,140. This number needs to be three times as much in order for NCGS to thrive. Please remember to recruit people for membership in NCGS – recruit at least two people and get a free **NCGS Tote Bag**. Please renew your membership and encourage others to renew.

This year the Society began taking credit cards (Visa & MasterCard) for book sales, memberships and workshop registrations. Using the credit cards has made it easier for patrons to pay at NCGS workshops and national conferences.

Several NCGS Board members attended the NGS workshop in Nashville TN. We made a profit on book sales and memberships. Mrs. Oakley and Mrs. Cowell attended the Moore County workshop in Southern Pines in March, 2005. Mrs. Oakley took books and membership applications to both of the NCGS workshops - Wilmington in March and Raleigh in November, 2005. Both workshops were successful.

A new copy machine was purchased for the Society. New NCGS brochures were printed. The Secretary furnished copies of the NCGS roster of the Board of Directors and Committee Chairpersons, amended by-laws, standing rules, and notebooks for new Board members.

The Society purchased new software for the membership database. This software provides a way to send our newsletter and journal labels electronically, directly to the printer. This was a cost savings idea proposed by the Board of Directors, and it eliminated the two companies we used to make labels and to mail the newsletters, etc. This idea was first implemented in August, 2004 and has continued through 2005 with success.

This year, I have worked diligently on the Bible Records Project by inputting records for the book. Data entry volunteers were not forthcoming, so your Secretary has tried to complete the project. The book

should be in the printer's hands by year's end. I would like to thank all the people who contributed records. I also appreciate your patience in waiting for your book.

The NCGS book storage was moved this year because the previous storage building was sold. The books were moved by J. Douglas Oakley to a structure he built specifically to hold the NCGS books. He did not charge the Society anything for the job – saving the Society from \$1,500 to \$2,000. Three of our publications sold out during 2005. The prices on a few of the books for 2006 will be lowered to help move more books into researcher's hands.

Thank you so much for allowing me to continue as your secretary. Good recruiting!!
