Nearly 900 people attended the two-day event held 6-7 November 2015 at the State Archives and State Library and at the McKimmon Conference and Training Center on the NC State campus. Attendees came from California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Wisconsin, West Virginia, and Washington, DC.

On Friday, the State Archives and State Library of North Carolina hosted presentations by staff members Debbi Blake, Ashley Yandle, and Michelle Underhill. State Archivist Sarah Koonts led guided tours of the exhibit, "Treasures of Carolina . . . Stories from the State Archives," which is currently taking place at the North Carolina Museum of History.

Saturday's events included presentations by Ancestry.com staff Crista Cowan, Anna Swayne, Craig Bullough, and Lisa Arnold. NCGS President Victoria Young, Debbi Blake, and Rebecca Hyman from the State Library joined the Ancestry.com staff for an "Ask the Experts" session. Burke County, North Carolina, Research

A few weeks ago I received a text from my son, Alex, with a picture of my two-year-old grandson, Cliff, sitting on a tractor and pointing toward the field of his Grandpa McCall's Burke County farm. He looked so happy and in awe of the land he was seeing on that calm and peaceful day. But it hasn't always been so peaceful in Burke County, North Carolina. An unfortunate aftermath of the Civil War in the South was burned courthouses and the resulting loss of records. Although the Burke County courthouse was not burned, many court records and most land records were destroyed by federal troops.

Burke County was created in April 1777 from Rowan County. The following records have survived.
