The 2016 Annual Meeting and Fall Workshop was a great day of learning new research techniques from Dave McDonald, CG, who presented thought-provoking concepts for both new and more experienced researchers. I was especially gratified to see,



by a show of hands, the vast range of involvement in genealogy by the 100+ individuals present that day. Twenty-five percent of the attendees were relatively new to family history research and about half described their experience in the 10-15 year range. What was insightful was the show of hands by individuals who have been researching their families for over 30 years (with one member researching for 42 years!), demonstrating the need by us all for continuous learning in the field of genealogy. We have so much to learn from each other, and programs sponsored by the North Carolina Genealogical Society are a terrific opportunity to do so.

Ed has served as Director and Publications Chair. His management of the North Carolina Loose Estates Project in collaboration with FamilySearch.org was recently completed, providing free access to 6,200,000 indexed images. Ed also worked tirelessly with his volunteers to complete indexing all 40 years of the North Carolina Genealogical Society Journal (every name and place), which will be available from the home page of the new NCGS website in 2017. Ed also prepared images of the index to Revolutionary Military Papers, 1767-1855 (Secretary of State's Office), which will be completed as a member benefit once the new website goes live.

In her role as Book Review Editor, Pam Pearson provided our readers with insight into new and backin-print titles relating to North Carolina genealogy in an engaging manner. Conscientious in fulfilling her responsibilities, Pam's submissions were always prepared in a timely manner, and her correspondence with author submissions was kind and professional.
