

"Enslaved, Free Persons of Color, and African American Research"



We are thrilled to bring you this issue which looks at some "off the beaten path" materials to assist in African American ancestral research.

This issue includes articles which explore the holdings of Joyner Library (ECU) and the Digital Library of American Slavery (UNC-G). Other articles focus on manumission and the records of eastern North Carolina – the 1860 census and apprenticeship records. "In Loving Remembrance of Sabra Robeson" explores previously unknown Southern ancestry commemorated in a beautiful stained-glass window. The "Timothy Hunter Papers" enlighten us on the diverse surviving record types documenting formerly enslaved ancestors.

We continue to share abstracts/transcripts of records we suggest you explore as you research your African American ancestry.

In addition to the resources highlighted in this issue, we recommend using this <u>free index</u> of the <u>Confederate Slave Payrolls</u> to further augment your research of enslaved individuals.
