North Carolina Migration Webinar Coming Up




Join us Wednesday, January 6, 2021 at 7:00 PM EST for <u>Migrations 2: North</u> Carolinians on the Move – Reconstruction and Early 20th Century Migration featuring Diane L. Richard.

About the webinar: Reconstruction and the early 20th century accelerated certain types of outmigration from the state. The economic devastation created by the Civil War and the needs of those formerly enslaved to reconnect with far flung family members resulted in many leaving North Carolina. Increasing discrimination against African Americans, World War I, and the depression fragmented many more North Carolina families. We'll explore the factors leading to out-migration from NC, efforts to replenish the workforce, and ways we might link "back to North Carolina."

Preview Screening of *Finding Your Roots with Henry Louis Gates Jr.* & Virtual Discussion





NCGS Partners with ECU Joyner Library on North Carolina Periodicals Index project



Think about how useful it would be to have a freely available and searchable statewide index of North Carolina genealogical and historical society journals. NCGS is embarking on a project to help make this a reality. The staff of the North Carolina Collection at East Carolina University's Joyner Library currently indexes selected articles in more than 60 North Carolina periodicals for the <u>North Carolina Periodicals</u> Index, and makes the index available online to the public at no cost.

However, only a few genealogical and historical society publications are included in the index at this time. NCGS will be actively promoting the NCPI to family history and genealogy researchers, encouraging North Carolina genealogical and historical societies to donate their journals to ECU for inclusion in the NCPI, developing a grant program to help defray the costs to societies who want to participate, and training volunteers who want to participate in indexing. This project will help connect researchers with local genealogical and historical societies holding valuable information not widely available online.

The Wilkes Genealogical Society, Inc. was established by a local small group of interested individuals in 1967. Since that time, the Society has published various types of genealogical materials and continues to collect and provide citizens with a wide array of materials for research endeavors. These materials are housed at the Wilkes County Public Library.

The Society focuses on the geographic region of Wilkes County which was formed in 1777 from Surry County and the District of Washington. Since then, various counties have been formed, or partly formed, out of Wilkes County. These couties include: Alexander, Ashe, Caldwell, and Watauga.

Wilkes Genealogical Society publishes a quarterly bulletin and has <u>60 publications</u> available for purchase ranging from transcripts of tax lists and land grants to deed books and court minutes.
