Freedom! A Promise Disrupted: North Carolina, 1862-1901

The Western Office of the N.C. Department of Natural and Cultural Resources will host the exhibit, **Freedom! A Promise Disrupted: North Carolina, 1862-1901**. The exhibit will be open to the public weekly from 10 a.m-2 p.m., Wednesday through Saturday. Admission is free.

Created by staff at the N.C. Museum of History in 2019, the exhibit depicts the struggle newly freed African Americans faced in the post-Civil War and Reconstruction Era of North Carolina.

The 2nd Journal issue in 2022 will focus on the Civil War, non-military records to

help us as researchers expand our horizons on what we might search for to help us pursue our serving ancestors and their families/community.

I have two projects for which I seek assistance. **DO NOT** start on any of these projects without first contacting me to both get instructions and to make sure that duplicative efforts by others are not already underway. If you are interested, please reach out to me.

(1) Charlotte Presbyterian Ladies Tract and secretary and treasurer's records of Soldiers Aid Society [via the Drury Lacy Papers, 1823-1965, UNC Collection Number 03641), https://finding-aids.lib.unc.edu/03641/ [folder 42 – digitized at the behest of NCGS]

You would be culling from this online collection the items related explicitly to the Soldiers Aid Society [total collection is 74 images and so some subset of that]. My thoughts are to identify what is in the folder and then abstract/transcribe anything juicy. I know that there is a membership list for the Charlotte Presbyterian Ladies Tract that needs to be transcribed. An excellent resource for those at home who helped the war effort.

(2) Explore the archives of the *Confederate*

Veteran magazine, https://onlinebooks.library.upenn.edu/webbin/serial?
id=confedvet [the list will take you to individual issues on the Internet Archive].

Are there any "articles, or data or info" about North Carolina veterans that you found particularly compelling or the kind of tidbits researchers might find elsewhere?
