A few years ago, the NCGS Journal published an issue dedicated to Toll Roads, Bridges, and Ferries (Volume 45, Number 4, Oct-Nov-Dec 2019). For an upcoming NCGS webinar (December 2023), this topic will be revisited.

I am seeking any of the following. All content must depict or involve North Carolina, though regional (VA, TN, GA, SC) examples may be considered.

The focus is the early 20th century (with a focus on the 1800s) and earlier records, not our modern experience with tolls.

So, vintage/historic ...

- (1) Images of toll booths/houses
- (2) Images of plank/toll roads
- (3) Images of toll ferries
- (4) Maps showing locations of "toll" roads, ferries, etc.
- (5) Maps/lists of toll booths/houses
- (6) Private collection records with records of collected tolls naming individuals or the toll keepers themselves
- (7) Anything else toll-related that I've not thought of!
